Andrea Schloemer

Schloemer didn't think of nerself as an artist, really.

When her mother was diagnosed with breast cancer, though, she considered her mother's example for living in an elegant, vital and constantly evolving fashion.

Her mother, Theresa "Tess" Cicero, was one of those women who, no matter what her circumstances or how she felt, was always impeccably put together and fashionable. Day-to-day details, manners, conversation — these were all ways to seek excellence for Cicero, Schloemer says.

Schloemer became more thoughtful about how she was spending her own life and decided to do what she had always wanted to do: paint.

Now, as a trained painter, she is paying tribute to her mother, who died six years ago. She is joined by her son Andrew Doyle.

Schloemer creates florals and landscapes that are rich in color and sure to be popular among local collectors. Doyle creates portraits of women
